## All About Bulbs!

One of the happiest signs of spring is that first tulip or daffodil emerging from the ground. When you see the tips of the leaves pop out, you know a beautiful bouquet is not too far behind. And even if snow falls on those leaves, the bulb is safely buried and protected from all that Mother Nature can throw at it.

Flowering spring bulbs (planted in the fall and then waiting to put on their show) attract pollinators, reduce garden maintenance, provide years of cut flowers, add diversity without taking up too much space, and provide abundant rewards for minimal work. With so many colors of tulips available along with the sunny yellows of daffodils and the whimsical purple of the giant allium you will be so thankful that you took the time to dig a few holes and drop in a few bulbs.

### Follow these simple tips to ensure your labors bear the flowers you want:

- Purchase your bulbs as early as you
  want and dream about spring, but don't
  plant until after October 10. This allows
  the ground to cool enough that they
  won't try to grow leaves that would be
  damaged by winter.
- Choose a location that gets plenty of sunshine and has well-drained soil.
   Fortunately, the leaves of these bulbs do most of their food-manufacturing before the trees create too much shade, so you can plant in spaces that you might not normally be able to.
   Bulbs do not like to be too wet, so make sure you choose a spot that doesn't sit under water as the snow melts or where the surrounding concrete warms the soil on sunny winter days to keep it from freezing solid.
- Dig the hole two to three times deeper than the bulb is tall and place the bulb pointy-end up (for allium bulbs, look for the roots and place those at the bottom). You can either plant individual bulbs with a small trowel or bulb auger, or you can make a bigger statement by planting in clusters of five or more.
- Fertilize with a good bulb fertilizer such as Espoma Bulb Tone or Bone Meal and protect tulip bulbs by soaking them with RepelsAll Animal Repellant.
   Daffodil and Allium bulbs are naturally unattractive to scavenging rodents.
- Water deeply to settle the bulbs and soil and get the roots started. Make yourself a cup of tea or hot chocolate, sit back and wait for spring:)

### Preparing Your Landscape for Winter

Did you know that preparing your landscape and garden for winter is not as labor-intensive and complicated as you may have been led to think? We fervently believe that you should put down your pruners and all the visions of a pristine flower bed lying dormant under the snow and enjoy your fall by walking through the woods; planting new trees, shrubs and perennials; transplanting existing perennials; and visiting your local pumpkin patches and apple orchards.



By not pruning, you are actually allowing the plant to protect itself as the foliage collapses in on itself and the branches catch blowing leaves and snow. Decomposing leaves add nutrients to the soil and provide habitat for over-wintering pollinators and beneficial insects. We do recommend cleaning up things like peony, phlox, and rose leaves that have had disease problems this growing season to help avoid problems for next year. Fall mulching in your gardens will help to conserve moisture and cut down on late season and early spring weed growth. Just remember to leave a little space around the plants so they can breathe.

One of the most beneficial things you can do in the fall, especially when it is as dry as this year, is to continue watering deeply at regular intervals until the ground is frozen. This is particularly important for plants that have been in their current location less than three years.

Once the ground has chilled and the plants are dormant, it will be very helpful to add some additional wood mulch around new plantings or shallow-rooted perennials. When there is little or no snow and it is a dry fall, the upper layers of soil are more prone to freeze and thaw which disturbs the roots of these plants and can even trigger early growth causing the plant to die during the winter.

In conclusion, you can enjoy your time in your yard this fall with a Pumpkin Spice Latte instead of pruners while you are watering and appreciating the colorchanges and fall bird and butterfly migrations. Tuck your babies in and get them ready for a nice winter nap.
